Outcome of draft heritage study for Balwyn and Balwyn North

In response to community feedback, Council has decided not to proceed with the recommendations of the draft heritage study for Balwyn and Balwyn North.

The draft study was completed in June 2014 and sought to identify places and precincts of local cultural heritage significance in the suburbs of Balwyn and Balwyn North (incorporating Deepdene and Greythorn). This included the re-assessment of 45 properties previously identified in the Camberwell Conservation Study.

The Draft Balwyn and Balwyn North Heritage Study recommended Heritage Overlays be applied to 26 individual properties and the four heritage precincts.

The Urban Planning Special Committee received 137 submissions regarding the proposal - 94 opposed to the heritage overlays, 22 in support and 21 neither in favour nor opposed.

Issues raised by submitters included impact to property values, disagreement with the heritage value of properties and precincts, objections to specific properties being included or not included in a heritage overlay and objection to properties being included on the possible Heritage Overlay Register.

Lobbying to protect Boroondara's trees

Trees are one of our City's most prized assets and the penalties that a Council can impose for such a breach of a local law are vastly inadequate.

The maximum fine, set by the State Government, is \$2000. We first started lobbying on this issue in 2008 and we continue to lobby to increase this penalty to a level that would provide a suitable deterrent for a breach.

The issue has been raised with the Minister for Local Government and Council has passed a resolution calling on the Municipal Association of Victoria to also increase its lobbying efforts. Where possible, Council prosecutes cases through the Magistrate's Court to provide additional deterrent.

In addition to penalties, Council maintains a program of proactive measures to deter destruction of canopy trees such as educating builders and property owners about our Tree Local Law, requiring tree management plans as



a condition of planning permits, routinely carrying out compliance inspections and meetings with builders to reinforce the need to comply.

Council maintains its view that the illegal removal of trees is a serious issue that has the potential to diminish the environmental and aesthetic appeal of our neighbourhoods.

Council pops up around town

On consecutive Saturdays in September, Council trialled a new way of engaging local people by "popping up" in Ashburton and Balwyn North.

Pop-up Council was the most popular idea at the inaugural Community Innovation Tournament in May and was tested on 5 and 12 September as a way of interacting with locals who are difficult to reach via our regular channels.

This idea captures the essence of what the Community Innovation Tournament wanted to achieve – find more innovative ways for the community and Council to work together.

The Boroondara community is a very busy one, and it can be difficult to find the time to catch up on important local information or visit Council during business hours so the idea brought Council to where people are rather than hoping they will come to us.

A number of councillors and Council officers from various departments were

Pop-up Council will be evaluated with a view to running them across the City again in the future.

Design for new North-East Community Hub almost complete

Planning is well underway for a new Community Hub in Balwyn North with detailed designs to be completed by early 2016.

Throughout June and July 2015, the community provided feedback on the concept plans through information sessions and through an online survey.

Feedback will assist in developing the detailed design for the \$17.3 million community hub at 2 Centre Way, Balwyn North.

For a number of years, Council has been considering opportunities to provide a facility in Balwyn North that could offer a range of needed community services and programs for residents.

Council is planning to demolish the RSL building which is currently on the site, as well as the adjacent Greythorn Early Childhood Centre and Maternal and Child Health Centre.

Temporary accommodation for the Greythorn Early Childhood Centre will be provided at the former Balwyn Leisure Centre in Balwyn Road. Families will also be able to access Maternal and Child Health services at Cherry Road Balwyn, Maud Street Balwyn North and Minifie Park Maternal and Child centres.

The new North-east hub will include:

- North Balwyn RSL and its memorabilia
- a neighbourhood house / community meeting rooms
- expanded Greythorn Early Childhood Centre
- relocated Greythorn Maternal and Child Health Centre
- allied health and counselling services
- a library lounge for pick-up and drop-off of library books, access to computers, community information and library programs
- community programs for all ages
- a large multi-purpose function room.
- · open space and memorial

The project will also include landscape beautification across Centre Way.

The community will be able to comment on the plans as part of the planning permit process.

Kew Occasional Care will meet all care needs

From December this year, the Kew Occasional Care centre will be leased to a community based committee of management that has been very successfully managing the North Balwyn Play Centre for 30 years.

All of the childcare places offered by this service are eligible for the Australian Government Approved Childcare Benefit scheme which will result in lower childcare costs for eligible families.

Council was not eligible to attract the Child Care Benefit as the operator of the Kew Occasional Care Centre.

Council endorsed a proposal in October to lease the Kew Occasional Care premises to the new operators based on the community benefits that the committee of management can provide, in particular, the ability to attract the rebate for child care for families, as well as funding for the support of children with additional needs.

As part of the transition to the new arrangements, all of the families who have had children receive care this year at either the Kew Occasional Care Centre or the North Balwyn Play Centre, will have all of their childcare needs in 2016 met.

Council Grants for all ages, the fit and the active

Once again, in 2015, Boroondara residents have enjoyed the benefits of the Community Strengthening Grants Program, run in partnership with the Rotary Club of Balwyn.

The grants program supports community organisations to meet the social, cultural, economic, recreational and environmental needs of Boroondara residents, as outlined in council's strategic plan.

In total, \$375,129 in funding was distributed - \$224,365 from Rotary and \$150,764 from council. Ninety-three organisations across Boroondara received funding.

A range of sporting club programs was funded in Bellevue Ward

including those run by Greythorn Football Club, Greythorn Park Tennis Club and North Balwyn Bowls Club.

Transport subsidies for local tours were provided to a number of community groups such as Balwyn War Widows Association, Ladies Probus, Probus Club of North Balwyn and Greythorn.

Young people didn't miss out either with a grant for a hurdles upgrade for the Kew Little Athletics Club.

Balwyn Library redevelopment

The design for the redevelopment of the Balwyn Library is currently being finalised with construction expected to begin in late 2016.

The redevelopment will ensure the local community has access to a contemporary library with attractive and appealing spaces to meet, read and study.

It will be an active, welcoming destination for events and activities, and a place for people of all abilities and interests to connect to information, new technology and their community.

During construction, the Balwyn Library service will be temporarily relocated to the former Balwyn Leisure Centre premises in Balwyn Road.

Relocating the library service to Balwyn Leisure Centre is the most suitable option in terms of maintaining a high level of service for library users.

It is also seen as the most suitable temporary space to accommodate the collection and be a comfortable space

for users. There is also adequate parking available.

The proposal represents the best use of ratepayer funds as the cost of retaining Balwyn Leisure Centre for temporary accommodation is estimated to be considerably less than the alternatives that have been investigated, resulting in the library being located in portables.

Council will continue to keep Balwyn Library users informed of temporary relocation plans.
